GOVERNING THE CHURCH

Just a few weeks ago, our church ordained Ryan Taber to serve in the role of Associate Pastor for our church. I am so thankful for the clear calling upon Ryan's life and am excited about him serving in this capacity. In our study of Timothy and Titus we have talked a lot about the role of pastors/elders and deacons in the church. But as important as those leadership roles are, we must never forget the crucial function of the congregation in governing the church.

Many church members don't understand the importance of church governance, and choose to treat it as a matter of indifference. However, this must not and cannot be our approach. In our desire to be biblical about the leadership roles of pastors and deacons, we cannot ignore the clear teaching of Scripture that establishes the final rule regarding the theological and methodological decisions of the church.

We believe the Scriptures teach that the entire church body has the final authority in matters of doctrine and discipline. On multiple occasions I have preached on this very topic. The most recent would have been the message on 1 Timothy 5:17-25, and I invite you to listen to that sermon on our website. But let me briefly share a couple reminders. We see in Matthew 18, regarding discipline in the church, that the congregation is the final court of appeal. Also, in Galatians 1:6-9, Paul instructs the congregation that they are responsible for

dealing with and rejecting false teachers. Paul did not give this command to the pastors alone, but to the congregation. Nowhere do we see in Scripture pastors acting unilaterally in the critical decisions of the church.

This means that although you are to trust your pastors, follow their leadership, protect their reputation, listen to them as they teach you the Scriptures, and help you grow as a disciple, you are not to neglect your responsibility as a member of the church to carry out your own biblical responsibility. I hope as the New Year approaches, that you will commit yourself to being actively involved in our members meetings when we discuss the business of the church. Being absent from these meetings does not negate responsibility for what takes place there. We cannot afford to neglect the responsibility that God has given us as members of our church to be an active part of the governing of our church.

In my desire to accurately teach what the Scriptures say regarding the role of pastors/elders, I never want to cause any member of our church to think this means they should sit back and ignore the role God has for them in the governing of the church. I believe that when the leadership of the church works in harmony with the whole church – both submitting to the authority of Scripture – we are able to make decisions that honor and glorify God. Pray that God would give you a desire to fulfill this critical duty so that together we can walk in complete obedience to God's Word – even in how we make decisions for the life of the church.

SOUND THEOLOGY

An interesting parallel exists between the practice of music performance and the study of the Bible. The more I've thought about this, the more I realize this parallel extends to every artistic discipline, and is something in which I believe we Christians should strive to grow our discernment.

There are two main schools of thought in music (classical music, in particular). On one side, you have the "purists," so to speak, who spend countless hours doing research on composers and their pieces to find out everything they can regarding the author's intentions for the piece. In some older musical scores, mysterious markings or unfamiliar words are used to instruct the performer as to how they should perform a certain section or a note. "Purists" will spend a lot of time researching these terms to be sure that they play that piece exactly as the composer intended. Some performers are so devoted to this process, that they will only play these pieces on musical instruments built with the technologies that were available at the time of the composition (this means no power tools).

Another school of thought believes that the purist this process is not important. I once bought a vinyl record (that I've since learned was immensely popular) of electronic synthesizer versions of popular pieces written by J. S. Bach. The record is called "Switched-On Bach" and prominently features a Moog synthesizer in re-imaginings of some of his masterworks. Some critics suggested that Bach might have very well been switched on by this record, but only in the manner of Frankenstein's monster to avenge this wrongdoing. Nevertheless, many modern artists operate in this paradigm, and insist that art is what you make it, and what the artist originally intended is relatively unimportant in the artistic process.

This philosophy extends to every area of life. How often do you have conversations about the filmmaker's intent with your friends after viewing a movie? How often does your family discuss what moral messages the editors of that reality TV show wanted to put across in your living room? How often do you consider the architecture of a home and ponder the intent in what we perceive as modern eyesores?

Authorial intent is important in all the arts, though not vital. However, authorial intent is absolutely critical in the study of the Bible. You can see how the re-inventing mindset has crept into Bible study. Just as art has become more "progressive," our interpretation of and approach to the Bible has followed suit. Instead of asking the ever-important question, "what did Paul mean when he wrote this?" we start on the wrong end with, "what does this passage mean to me?"

The truth is, it doesn't matter what a passage means to us. The author's intent must be understood before we can explore how a passage applies to us today. Let's commit together to avoid short-circuiting the process of Bible interpretation.

FINISHING LIFE FOR CHRIST

"So even to old age and gray hairs, O God, do not forsake me, until I proclaim your might to another generation, Your power to all those to come" (Psalm 71:18).

Author and pastor John Piper, in his booklet *Rethinking Retirement*, says, "Finishing life to the glory of Christ means finishing life in a way that makes Christ look glorious. It means living and dying in a way that shows Christ to be the all-satisfying treasure that He is. So it would include, for example, not living in ways that make this world look like your treasure. Which means that most of the suggestions that this world offers us for our retirement years are bad ideas. They call us to live in a way that would make this world look like our treasure. And when that happens, Jesus is belittled."

I was recently reminded of this thought when I heard a retired pastor friend of 40 years share at Green Acres Baptist Church in Tyler. Dr. Bill Everett said, "You do not retire from serving the Lord until you take your final breath!" Brother Bill and his wife are in their early 80's and she has cancer. He told example after example of how the Lord had presented opportunities for witnessing and presenting the gospel. One was when they boarded the Amtrak train in Longview for their trip to California to visit family. Before the train left the station, they had numerous conversations with people of all ages about their spiritual conditions. It was amazing to hear how God used these situations for them to bear witness. The old porter on the train that greeted them as they boarded took note of this. He told them, "I overheard some of your conversations with different ones as I went about my work. He told them, "I will keep them on Amtrak and you keep them on the right track!" It hit me like a ton of bricks! God is not finished using you to glorify Him till your final breath! Today as I write this, we held Buddy Hicks celebration service. Here was a prime example of this scenario. Buddy served and glorified God even until his last breath! Even though his body was so weak, and his mind was not as sharp as it used to be, he spoke of God and His mercy and goodness and faithfulness to him through 84 years of life. What a blessing and encouragement for all of us still left!

John Piper ends his booklet with this promise from Isaiah 46:3-4, "You have been borne by me from before your birth, carried from the womb; even to your old age I am he, and to gray hairs I will carry you. I have made, and I will bear; I will carry and save." Piper goes on to say, "Don't be afraid, Christian, You will persevere. You will make it home. Sooner than you think. Live dangerously for the One who loved you and died for you in his 30's. Don't throw your life away on the American dream of retirement. You are as secure as Christ is righteous and God is just. Don't settle for anything less than the joyful sorrows of magnifying Christ in the sacrifices of love. And then in the Last Day, you will stand and hear, "Well done, good and faithful servant... Enter into the joy of your Master" (Matthew 25:21,23).

TEACH US TO PRAY

A few weeks back a professor of mine in seminary started class by asking a question I had never thought of. "Who taught you to pray?" he asked. I had never thought about that in my life. He went on to explain that typically people pray like the people who have been most influential in their lives pray. I remember a time in college when a leader in the church just said, "God just wants to hear from you, so just tell him what you want." Is prayer something that needs to be taught? Or is it just something that you do and as long as you are doing it, God is happy?

Luke 11:1 says this: "Now Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord teach us to pray, as John taught his disciples." The disciples recognized that their prayers were lacking. This brings us to a difficult question, is there a wrong way to pray? 1 John 5:13-15 says this: "I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God that you may know that you have eternal life. And this is the confidence that we have toward him, that if we ask for anything according to his will he hears us. And if we know that he hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests that we have asked of him." John says that our confidence in prayer comes from praying in a way that is consistent with God's will. If we are praying prayers that are out of God's will, then there is no promise that he hears us.

If there is a wrong way to pray, and if both Jesus and John's disciples needed to be taught how to pray, maybe we should be more intentional in teaching our children and other young disciples how to pray. Jesus responded by saying, "When you pray, say; Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day our daily bread, and forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone who is indebted to us. And lead us not into temptation." This seems like a good place to start.

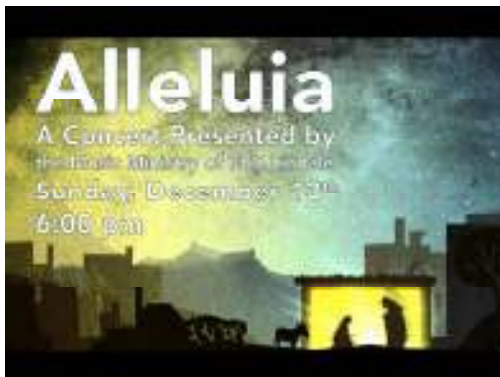
