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TEACH A MAN TO FISH

“Amazing! I don’t know how the pastor got all of that out of the passage!” These are the last words a pastor wants to hear. For one, we want you to leave more impressed with the Word of God than with us. But secondly, we seek to explain truth in such a way that people leave saying, “The text is so clear to me now.” Good preaching is not built on the cleverness of the preacher but on the plain meaning of the text. Our hope for you is that as you sit under the preaching of the Word, God will make you increasingly capable of studying the Bible on your own. The goal is not to make the sermon or teaching as easy to digest as possible; the goal is to make it as helpful as possible. We want a church full of people growing in Christian maturity, and one cannot be a mature Christian without knowing how to read and understand the Bible. To that end, here are a few resources that teach you how to read the Bible:

- *Dig Deeper* (Beynon/Sach) – This is an accessible book that teaches sixteen basic tools that we use when interpreting the Bible. I highly recommend it.
- *How to Read the Bible for All It’s Worth* (Fee/Stuart) – The approach taken by Stuart and Fee is to look at the different genres of the Bible (e.g. law, gospel, prophecy, letters) and lay out the principles that guide how to interpret that genre. It’s a little bit more advanced but very helpful.
- *God’s Big Picture* (Roberts) – When reading the Bible, it’s vitally important not to lose sight of the forest for the trees. In other words, if you’re going to understand a particular passage, you need to understand how it fits within the wider story of the Bible. This book does a great job of showing the unified story of the Bible, from Genesis to Revelation. [Note: the book is a bit simplistic in its dealing with the end times and should be read with a bit of caution in these areas.]

As you sit under the preaching at FBC, as you work through the Sunday School study guides, and as you take advantage of various resources, we hope that you learn to study and understand the Bible for yourself. As the old proverb says it: we don’t want to give you a fish, we want to teach you to fish.

PASTORS’ Q&A

QI would like to know the best way to pray for our president and other government officials?

AThis is a great question. I Timothy 2:1-4 makes clear that we must pray for our government leaders and ties our prayers to 1) our own godly, meek lives and 2) God’s desire for all to be saved. This is important stuff! Here are a few principles that should guide us:

- 1) Trust in God. Our prayers should flow from the calm confidence that God is the true King of this world, and government leaders are powerless before Him (Psalm 2:1-6, Proverbs 21:1).
- 2) Praise. 1 Timothy says that we should give thanks to God for our government leaders. God has ordained civil governments because mankind in anarchy is worse than virtually any government. No matter how bad, we should praise God for our government leaders.
- 3) Salvation. Whether our elected leaders claim to know God or not, we should pray that their hearts would yield to Christ. Only then can a leader really lead with the necessary humility and genuine dependence upon God.
- 4) Justice. The common biblical instruction given to governmental leaders is to execute justice. Pray that our leaders would act justly, particularly for the poor and helpless (including the unborn!).

PLEASING GOD WITH CHURCH MUSIC (PART THREE)

A few months ago, I pointed out the fact that many churches operate their music ministries based on this fundamental question: "What music pleases the masses?" First Baptist Church is striving to take a different approach to her music. Instead of venturing to accomplish the impossible task of pleasing every person that walks in our doors, we ask the question, "What music pleases God?" In this article, I'll continue the discussion as to how we please God with the words of our songs.

What words should we sing in our worship services? It seems like a goofy question, I'm sure. But when you stop to think about it, the possibilities are endless. Sure, most churches have a general commitment to singing songs that pertain specifically to the Christian faith. But is every "Christian" song ever written acceptable to God? What would He have us sing?

Some people take this approach: we can sing anything except what the Bible forbids. The songwriter in me really wants to like this approach. What artistic freedom! However, when I sit down with pen and paper, I'm terrified that my unchecked thoughts about God might be inaccurate, or at the very least entirely un-profound. Where should we look for inspiration? The obvious answer is the correct one: the Bible.

Even if we accepted that everything permissible in the worship service, Paul's wisdom should surely apply here, too: not everything is beneficial. When we think about song lyrics to use in worship services, we should be sure that the songs we use aren't merely biblically *acceptable*. ("Mary Had A Little Lamb" is biblically acceptable – nothing wrong or unholy contained there.) Our songs should be biblically *driven*. By this, I mean that the words should be inspired by, taken from, and checked thoroughly against Scripture. The more we can imitate the Word of God in our songs, the more confident we can be that we're singing truth – and therefore – that the words of our songs are pleasing to God.

The more we venture from the ideas, themes, and language of Scripture, the more we are at risk of singing something that is untrue. It's easy to construct metaphors or stories to entertain or inspire a congregation. It's also easy to write down our unfiltered thoughts about God, the world, and ourselves. Yet Christians are called to a higher standard: we are to model every aspect of our lives after Scripture and the example of Jesus Christ. The lyrics of our music are no exception.

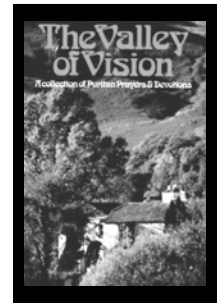
